








"The presence of the Bishops was so important! It's good to know that they do care for the youth, and are offering their prayers and advice."

"The Final Mass was a testament to the validity of faith of the Catholic youth of Australia...it was such an honour to receive such blessings from all the Bishops of Australia."






The close of the Festival was celebrated in a magnificent public Mass in the Domain, next to Sydney's Royal Botanic Garden.

YEAR OF YOUTH

To begin celebrations of 10 years since WYD08, the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference in partnership with the Archdiocese of Sydney hosted the Australian Catholic Youth Festival 2017. From 7-9 December over 20,000 young people, Bishops, religious, teachers, youth minsters and organisations came together to highlight and celebrate the vibrant life and importance of young people in the Catholic Church in Australia. It was the largest gathering of the Catholic Church in Australia since WYD08.
