Welcome

Welcome and thank you for being a part of the Australian Catholic Men's Gathering. Established by the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference (ACBC) in 2020, this initiative builds upon a history of men's groups and reinforces the ongoing importance of gathering as men in the faith environment to ensure the Gospel is alive in our homes and communities.

The Australian Catholic Men's Gathering aims to inspire and encourage all men with a vision for personal discipleship, service and mission in the family, parish, diocese, and the world. It is a free online resource offered to registered participants in partnership with local hosting communities.

In this guide you will find resources for preparation, promotion, participation and hosting this initiative. We understand each community is different and may facilitate the experience based on men's availability, spiritual journey, contexts and local realities. The resources offer flexibility to support you in making the most of this moment of grace.

How to use the guidelines

Program: Consider which program type you will offer: full day, half day, evening or online.

Promotion and Preparation: As you make arrangements for the gathering, begin promotion immediately utilising the many resources available online.

Prayer: Pray in the lead-up to the gathering for its success and ensure you have prepared joyful prayers for the gathering.

Hosting and Honouring: Be a gracious and Christian host, honouring those gathered.

Program

The Australian Catholic Men's Gathering is proposed as a full day gathering of men in local communities around Australia. The sample program outlines a spacious agenda where men can reflect on nationally supplied videos, discuss in small groups locally and discern ways of moving forward personally and in their communities. Many bishops are hosting gatherings based on this proposed agenda and you are encouraged to link with these where possible (see <u>Find a Place to Gather</u>).

However, it is not always possible to offer the program in this way and several alternative agendas are presented below to provide flexibility. An alternative agenda and style of gathering is much preferred rather than not being able to gather at all.

Five videos will be released on July 30. The <u>speakers' biographies can be found online</u>, with topics and approximate running times listed below.

Each Keynote presentation will be accompanied by a set of reflection questions to use in your local gatherings (see Section 6).

These videos can be utilised in a variety of agenda and gathering styles, however there are several key elements which are essential to all approaches:

- **Fellowship:** We must allow time to get to know each other, our stories, what's has happened this week and our faith encounters. This is demonstrated by long breaks to meet and connect with other men.
- **Prayer**: We must gather to pray and be prayerful in our gathering. This is demonstrated by allowing enough time to pray in your program, with local preparation and leadership.
- **Small Group Discussion:** We must share, explore and speak aloud to each other in small groups to share our learnings and yearnings inspired by the sessions. This is demonstrated by 'small' groups (4-6 men) and suitable discussion time to allow for deeper reflection.

Program examples

The following are examples and need to be considered in light of local community resources, distances, COVID-19 restrictions, accessibility and appeal.

Promotion and Preparation

The Australian Catholic Men's Gathering is an evangelisation initiative. The invitation, welcome and hospitality of your gatherings are critical to this mission. We are working in partnership with the Holy Spirit to prepare the way of the Lord and allow Him to evangelise.

Some promotional and preparatory guides are included below, to help you make the most of this moment of grace. In all we do we strive to ensure the safety of those gathered (physically, mentally, emotionally and spiritually) and to create a space for the Holy Spirit.

Promotion

The <u>Australian Catholic Men's Gathering website</u> has a <u>promotional resources</u> page with a parish bulletin notice, graphics and presenter information. Please visit this page and utilise these tools in your local community newsletters, networks, and on social media. Be sure to include a personal invitation and details of your hosting site.

The <u>National Centre for Evangelisation Facebook page</u> has a number of promotional videos from the Bishops and presenters. Please consider sharing these videos on your social media platforms. Be sure to follow the page to receive regular updates and news of ongoing initiatives.

Be sure to <u>Register your Hosting Site</u> on the website so men in your area can find and connect with your gathering. This is an important outreach and evangelisation strategy of the Men's Gathering. You also may like to help men you know to <u>Find a Place to Gather</u> by sharing the national list via your personal and organisational networks.

Encourage all men prior, during or after the event to <u>Register for Free</u> on the website. By registering, participants will be supported into the future with resources, messages of hope, future opportunities and newsletters to support their journey. It also helps to build the network of faith-filled men and organisations around the country.

Why Gather Men?



In the 2020 Men's Gathering, keynote speaker Daniel Ang shared of the diminishing presence of men in the Church. Identifying some of the urgent matters to be addressed to support men, Daniel highlighted the role of men and how the Church must be attentive to and renew its support of Catholic men in Australia.

You are encouraged to view Daniel's 10-minute presentation, Where are all the Men? to become informed of the valuable role you play as a Hosting Site Coordinator. You can find all the 2020 Event Resources online if you wish to refresh yourself prior to hosting a gathering.

Preparation

Hosting a group of men is a rewarding experience and a critical ministry for the Church. In preparing we must develop an understanding of the importance of this ministry as well as make the logistical preparations needed.

Logistical Preparations

Hosting a gathering could seem overwhelming, however the Church often gathers people together and is set up to support you and to make it an easy process. Here are a few simple steps and elements to be aware of:

- Your Hosting Site: It is recommended that you gather large groups of men at a parish, diocesan, or school location, thus utilising existing resources and processes to ensure the safety of the men and yourself. Existing church sites have trained staff and processes to manage workplace health and safety (or state equivalents), insurance, risk management, catering procedures, COVID-19 requirements, etc. Liaise with venue staff to ensure you have the support you need and meet the standards required. They are there to help.
- Small Groups or Home Gatherings: If you are gathering a small group of men in your home or other location, then please ensure you are aware of local COVID-19 restrictions, attendees' food allergies, and any possible scenarios which may come up. These aren't always life-threatening situations, but a simple brainstorming of situations and how you would deal with them would assist you to respond safely and calmly. See suggestions below.
- **COVID-19 Requirements:** COVID-19 is still a very real concern to our community and our gatherings. Firstly, if you are preparing for a gathering, you must check your local state health department's website for the status of requirements and restrictions related to COVID-19. Please respond accordingly, including adhering to physical distancing and venue capacities, mask requirements, provision of hand sanitiser and appropriate check-in procedures.
- Alternative Gathering Plan: In light of the fluctuating COVID-19 realities and potential changes in the availability of your group, it will be helpful to make alternative arrangements to participate in case restrictions or a lockdown are implemented at short notice. This can include access to an online meeting platform (Zoom, Microsoft Teams, Skype, etc), alternative program options (see above), postponing the gathering to a later date, and contact details for your participants to provide up-to-date information.
- An over 18 Initiative: This gathering, its content and experience is aimed at men over the age of 18. If anyone under the age of 18 is to attend, you must adhere to diocesan safeguarding policies and develop a safeguarding response.
- **Hospitality:** Ensure you have created a welcoming and safe space for men to gather. Simple strategies are essential such as car parking, signage and directions, name tags, tea and coffee freely available, seating and a personal welcome. To meet some of these essentials, you may like to outline a small budget and discuss with your community leadership to ensure you have more than adequate hospitality for your gathering.

- Ask for Help and Coordinate: In attempting to do everything ourselves we often fulfil tasks poorly or miss opportunities to be present to the group gathered. Invite others to assist, lead and share where possible. This allows you to 'coordinate' and arrive at the gathering open to what the Holy Spirit might ask of you. At the gathering, we want to be Mary at the feet of Jesus, rather than Martha racing around busy.
- Some simple considerations for Hosting Site Coordinators include:
 - o If you have to postpone or cancel... do you have an alternative meeting plan and schedule, can you contact participants to notify them of the change?
 - o Imagine arriving at your own venue... What time of day is it and how would you feel? What would you expect? What would be unexpected and nice to have?
 - o If a participant become ill... can you respond with first aid or by calling an ambulance?
 - o If a participant discloses something confronting or challenging... how would you respond, who can you connect them with?
 - o If a disagreement occurs... how would you resolve the discussion and move forward?
 - o If a participant cannot get home because their car won't start or public transport has stopped... how could you help them?
 - o If a participant is moved by the experience and stays behind to chat and wants to know more or share their personal faith encounter... will you have time to invest with them? What would you say? Where would you direct them for ongoing spiritual support?
 - o What else can you think of?



Prayer


Prayer is foundational to any gathering of the faithful. We invite all leaders and participants to pray in preparation for the gathering, together during the initiative and then together to discern ways of praying beyond your meeting. Please find some examples and resources for prayer which you may find helpful below.

Your Local Community of Men

The 2021 Men's Gathering focuses on bringing together men locally and utilising their talents. In the first instance, you are encouraged to invite local men to prepare and lead your prayer. Our communities are filled with talented men, musicians, readers, speakers and leaders, and many others who are willing to be involved if invited. Take the time to identify, accompany and prepare men to lead your community in prayer.

Year of St Joseph

In this year of St Joseph, we encourage you to pray with St Joseph through a <u>selection of prayers and reflections</u> <u>assembled by the ACBC</u>. Including material from the Vatican, monthly prayers and reflections by Australian Bishops and leaders, this collection of material will support you during your gathering and provide ongoing prayer and formation for the rest of the year.



Novena (Appendix A)

A novena prayer has been prepared by the working committee to be prayed across Australia from Thursday 22 July until Friday 30 July. Attached as Appendix A, the novena contains daily scripture, reflection and a daily prayer to St Joseph.

(A novena (from Latin: novem, "nine") is an ancient tradition of devotional praying in Christianity, consisting of private or public prayers repeated for nine successive days or weeks. The nine days between the Feast of the Ascension and Pentecost, when the disciples gathered in the upper room and devoted themselves to prayer, is often considered to be the first novena.)

As we pray earnestly for this virtual gathering, let us ask God to visit with us, work with us and send us out to be missionaries in our homes, families and parishes. We pray that we may be carriers of God's contagious love to our wives, children, brothers and sisters in Christ. Let us pray for an extraordinary visitation during this time together. Let us petition the Virgin Mary to ask her Son Jesus for a special outpouring of grace for the sons of the Father that gather for this event.

Hosting and Honouring

As the event occurs, we must be a gracious and Christian host to everyone who attends. Having shared the responsibilities of the gathering with a small team or inviting participants to make contributions, we can be attentive and positive in how we act, speak, and respond to all participants. This gathering is about the men gathered; be of service to them.

Photos and Testimonies

Be sure to take some simple photos of the gathering. Capture small groups and faces, rather than large, broad photos. Collect names if you don't know them. Invite participants to share their experiences with some small quotes and thoughts. These photos and testimonies can make up a parish newsletter reflection or social media post to share the gifts of the day. It can also be shared with the diocese or nationally to celebrate men gathering in this way. Highlighting not just the gathering, but men gathering to share their faith is an important evangelisation mission for us into the future.

Thank you

Any gathering requires a time to give thanks for those who have prepared the event, but also to those who have shared. Each sample agenda includes a time to express our gratitude. A time of thanks should be prepared and include three elements:

- To organisers and guests: to those who planned, prepared and facilitated the gathering. The speakers and those who lead prayer locally.
- To those gathered: To the men who choose to gather, who took a risk to attend and the families who have supported you to attend.
- What are you thankful for?: Invite the group to share with the person next to them something they are thankful for from the gathering. Something they learnt or experienced during their time together.



Summary and Group Discussion

Session 1: Man of God - Tomasz Juszczak

In this presentation, Tomasz looks at what it means to be a man of God and how – as men – we can live that out in our lives. Using St Joseph as the ultimate model, Tomasz shows how Jesus' earthly father encompasses the fullness of what it means to be a man of God. Tomasz also shares his own personal story; the successes and struggles of trying to live this more genuinely in his life. There are also some very simple practical tips on what we can do to more closely respond to God's call of becoming men after His own heart.



Questions

- 1. Was there anything in Tomasz's presentation that inspired you or called you forward in living more fully as a man of God? Why?
- 2. Can you identify a struggle in your life at the moment that keeps you from living as a man of God?
- 3. What is one practical commitment you can make right now that will help you in growing as a man after God's own heart?

Session 2: Man of Service - Tim Davis

Tim Davis shares the challenges facing men of faith, as they try to navigate themselves and their families through this secular world towards a deeper relationship with God and authentic service and love of Him and our neighbour. Through sharing his experiences and some strategies that he has learnt from other good role models in his life, Tim challenges us to respond honestly to the questions:

- Am I truly open to God's will?
- What am I doing daily to give God opportunities to speak to me, nourish me and direct my service?



Questions

- 1. Who are the people in my life I am called to serve/how am I called to serve them?
- 2. What challenges (internal and external) am I facing in serving those I am called to serve?
- 3. What strategy will I focus on this week to enable me to serve more effectively (Prayer, Sacraments, Scripture etc)? What concrete action will I do today to make it happen?
- *Optional Question: If I was asked to deliver my 30-second 'Elevator Testimony' to explain to someone why I am Catholic, what would I say?

Session 3: Man of Character - Shayne Bennett

Each of us is fearfully and wonderfully made but our full potential as men of character is unleashed through a personal encounter with Jesus Christ and an active surrender to the Holy Spirit. We know we're not perfect, but don't be discouraged by your own failures or limitations. We draw on the grace that God gives us. As men, we have to learn to face our weaknesses depending on God's mercy and strength. Look at St Peter! Look at St Paul! These were not perfect men – they became men of incredible character – often through suffering, through making mistakes, through learning to be obedient – but always with the help of the Holy Spirit. The same Holy Spirit lives in us and wants to do a great work in and through us.



Questions

- 1. If you were to describe your top two character traits, what would they be?
- 2. How has your relationship with Jesus impacted your character?
- 3. If you could change one aspect of your character, what would it be?

APPENDIX A Novena

Thursday July 22, 2021

Feast day of St Mary Magdalene

Reflection: John 20: 11-18

But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. They said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping?" She said to them, "They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him." When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said



to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "Rabbouni!" (which means Teacher). Jesus said to her, "Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord"; and she told them that he had said these things to her.

Friday July 23, 2021

Feast day of St Bridget of Sweden

Reflection: Matthew 13:18-23

"Hear then the parable of the sower. When anyone hears the word of the kingdom and does not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what is sown in the heart; this is what was sown on the path. As for what was sown on rocky ground, this is the one who hears the word and immediately receives it with joy; yet such a person has no root, but endures only for a while, and when trouble or persecution arises on account of the word, that person immediately falls away. As for what was sown among thorns, this is the one who hears the word, but the cares of the world and the lure of wealth choke the word, and it yields nothing. But as for what was sown on good soil, this is the one who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and yields, in one case a hundredfold, in another sixty, and in another thirty."

Saturday July 24, 2021

Feast day of St Sharbel Makhluf

Reflection: Matthew 13:24-30

He put before them another parable: "The kingdom of heaven may be compared to someone who sowed good seed in his field; but while everybody was asleep, an enemy came and sowed weeds among the wheat, and then went away. So when the plants came up and bore grain, then the weeds appeared as well. And the slaves of the householder came and said to him, 'Master, did you not sow good seed in your field? Where, then, did these weeds come from?' He answered, 'An enemy has done this.' The slaves said to him, 'Then do you want us to go and gather them?' But he replied, 'No; for in gathering the weeds you would uproot the wheat along with them. Let both of them grow together until the harvest; and at harvest time I will tell the reapers, Collect the weeds first and bind them in bundles to be burned, but gather the wheat into my barn.'"

Sunday July 25, 2021

World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly

In January, Pope Francis announced the institution of a World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly, which will take place each year on the fourth Sunday in July, close to the feast of Sts Joachim and Anne, the grandparents of Jesus.

Reflection: John 6:1-15

After this Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. Jesus went up the mountain and sat down there with his disciples. Now the Passover, the festival of the Jews, was near. When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming toward him, Jesus said to Philip, "Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?" He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered him, "Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little." One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?" Jesus said, "Make the people sit down." Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, "Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost." So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets. When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world."

When Jesus realised that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain by himself.

Jesus told the crowds all these things in parables; without a parable he told them nothing. This was to fulfill what had been spoken through the prophet: "I will open my mouth to speak in parables; I will proclaim what has been hidden from the foundation of the world."
